Before anything else, let me mention the Smart Meters and say yes we have had some issues. As with any change, there are usually some problems, but we are working through them with the different contractors. Please be patient with the girls in the water office, this has been a change and challenge for them as well. They are learning a new system and sometimes have to research each situation to find solutions. We will work through the problems together. But remember as I mentioned in previous newsletter articles these meters are based on actual usage so your bill may increase or it may decrease but first we have to determine if everything is working properly.

This past year has been another great year for the City of Milton. These are a few of our accomplishments: purchased a new bucket truck and a new blacktop roller for the Street Department, purchased a new SUV for the Police Department and paid off the loan for the last 3 new cruisers, purchased new Christmas decorations, poured some new sidewalks and did some paving on Washington, 2nd, Adams, Mason, Pike, Mockingbird, Sunset and Hillview. The sidewalks and paving are possible due to the 1% Municipal Sales and Use Tax and we are just getting started. You will see more paving in the spring and we will continue as the monies allows.



Believe it or not—after 5 years the first phase of the Milton Walking Trail is finally complete! We will need to sow some grass seed in the spring but the track is complete. The weather is a little cool now for walking outside but be sure to check it out when its warmer.

Let me remind you of our snow removal schedule. The Street Department is called by our Police when roads are getting bad. They always plow and salt hills first, then intersections, then main roads and finally they work on back streets, alleys and sidewalks. An issue from last year that mainly occurred with businesses is when hiring someone to clear snow from your lot be sure they do not plow it onto sidewalks. Our workers try to keep sidewalks clear for those who travel by foot.

From the Inspector/Code Enforcer Josh Jackson

It's hard to believe that winter is here but we can not deny the cold weather. With winter weather comes all types of issues for our homes. There is always the dreaded frozen water pipes, the battle to keep warm, possible power outages and the list goes on.

Let me start with the dreaded frozen water pipes. There are a number of things you can do to prevent this. A simple and cost effective solution is wrapping your pipes with pre-cut pipe foam wrap. This is a fairly straight forward project. You can also line the crawl space around your house with plastic or a foam board. While your exterior walls to your house may be sealed well from the elements, your foundation may not be. Any small cracks or holes can form which will speed up the freezing process. A simple thing we sometimes over look is always remember to disconnect your garden hose from the outdoor spigot. Another approach is heat tape. Heat tape is wrapped around the pipe and plugged in to an electrical source creating the heat.



Since we have mentioned electrical, let's talk about that for a minute. Electrical and fire safety go hand in hand. A lot of homes in Milton, including mine, are older and we need to use heaters in addition to our main heat source. These heaters are fine to use as a supplementary heat source but according to the International Code Council they can not be the primary heat source. When using these heaters it is VERY important to follow all of the proper instructions. Do not use extension cords when using these heaters. Be sure to keep a clear area around these heaters.



Kerosene heaters should not be used in enclosed areas. Another heat source that should not be used in or under your home are the salamander or torpedo type heaters.



Remember not to overload your electrical circuits. If a breaker is tripping and keeps needing to be reset that is an indication there is an issue. If a breaker is tripping it is doing it's job. If there is any question about your electrical system you should contact a licensed and insured electrician to come inspect your wiring. This may save your life.

With that being said smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors are a must! Not only a good idea but it is also required per the code. All dwellings are required to have smoke detectors and any dwelling where natural gas is used for heating or cooking requires a carbon monoxide detector. If you rent your home or an apartment the landlord is responsible to provide these safety measures. They MUST provide you with a smoke detector and/or carbon monoxide detector.



Whatever the issue may be whether frozen pipes, electrical safety or any other building or property code issues, along with contractor questions before choosing someone to do any work you can reach me in my office at 304-743-3032, extension 202.

From the Utilities Department

From the Office—The Smart Meters have all been installed. And we have received some complaints and lots of questions, however for the number of water customers we have, that group has been small. It may take another month or so to get things smooth out. Sometimes it is difficult when our office is relying on other companies and sub-contractors who are responsible for installing, training and getting everything entered in our computers correctly. We will get answers to your questions and complaints but it may take a little longer than usual.



I know you have heard this several times but we are going to repeat it one more time—the old meters were not as accurate as these Smart Meters. Some of the old ones ran fast and some ran slow. The Smart Meter read actual water usage. We can pull up a graph showing your usage and we can see if you have a leak and we can see when you fix a leak. That means every drop that comes through your meter is registered. So remember your bill may increase or it may decrease.

Important 2nd Reminder—If you fail to keep a “Promise to Pay” agreement your water will be shut-off the next working day and you WILL have to pay the \$60.00 reconnect fee PLUS the full past due balance. If you fail to pay or are late on your “Deferred Payment Plan” agreement your water will be shut-off and you WILL have to pay the \$60.00 reconnect fee PLUS the full past due bill.



As a water customer, it is your responsibility to make sure we have the following: a correct mailing address, a current working phone number and a Current customer name (remove deceased family members).

From the Field—The cold weather can cause frozen water lines. Remember if you drip your water it will increase your bill. However, it is wise to do so if the weather is expected to be zero or below. Just remember it will increase your water usage which could increase your bill.



If your water lines freeze DO NOT open the meter lids yourself, contact the office. Opening the meter wells yourself is a Federal Offense and can cause the meter to freeze and bust. Smart Meters cost \$500.00 each and if you open the meter lid it will be at your expense.

We have already had a customer open the meter well and break the radio antenna which they will now be billed for a replacement and labor. These meter and parts are not cheap. Please contact the office DO NOT open yourself!

Police News from Chief Joe Parsons

I am hopeful that everybody had a safe and joyous holiday season so far and is looking forward to a fresh year in 2017. Here at the MPD we look back at 2016 and are thankful for a safe year with no serious injuries to any of our officers. This is impressive considering the number of encounters we generate with the public during the year. Consider this—during 2016 we took 468 offense reports, investigated 182 traffic crashes, and made 43 felony arrests and 249 misdemeanor arrests as well as 16 juvenile arrests. In addition we issued 2,960 traffic citations and another 562 written warnings. That does not count verbal warnings. These numbers are only through November and actual yearly totals will be somewhat higher. During the same time period the MPD took reports on \$86,436 worth of stolen property while recovering \$52,862 of stolen property. All this without any serious confrontations or injuries to officers. That is phenomenal.

To continue this record of officer safety we are investing in six (6) in car camera systems that will record each traffic encounter and actually the violation that the officer observed in some cases. We were so fortunate to receive a 2016 Chaney grant in the amount of \$9,850.00 to purchase these cameras. For those of you who are unaware, the Chaney's are formally from Milton and Cabell County and hit the lottery years ago. They then established a foundation for donating to worthy projects in Cabell County, Missouri and Oregon where they now reside. The Chaney's are wonderful people to work with and their foundation is doing great work in the communities they serve. We coupled the Chaney Foundation money with some drug forfeiture money we had available and purchased enough in car cameras for all of our full time officers. This is a major purchase for us and a huge step forward in preserving evidence of what actually happened during the traffic stop. Many thanks to the Chaney's for their generous gift.

Corporal Dean Bishop was awarded the *American Legion Outstanding Public Service Award* in December. In addition Dean was given the *Lifesaver Award* by the Cabell County EMS.

Patrolman Sean Beckett is halfway through his training as a Drug Recognition Expert and upon completion will become a huge asset in our ongoing battle to keep Milton's streets safe from drivers under the influence of Drugs rather than alcohol. Sean will be able to identify by observation and sobriety testing which drug the individuals are taking without a blood test.

Stormwater/Floodplain News by Randy Rutledge

Stormwater—You may have wondered what, if any, changes might be coming to stormwater management after the election of Donald Trump as President.

President-elect Trump has stated that his administration will focus on clean water. These statements support existing trends to decentralize water treatment, improve recycling and develop water infrastructure.



Candidate Trump took a strong position on clean water, especially after he visited Flint, Michigan in September. It is now a major policy position of the incoming administration, whose support for a major infrastructure initiative specifically targets our crumbling water systems.

On Facebook, President Elect Trump stated: "Everyone deserves clean air and safe drinking water regardless of race or income. Water infrastructure will be a big priority."

On Trump's website, the infrastructure section supports long-term investments in clean water. The policy states: "Make clean water a high priority. Develop a long-term water infrastructure plan with city, state and federal leaders to upgrade aging water systems. Triple funding for state revolving loan fund programs to help state and local governments upgrade critical drinking water and wastewater infrastructure."

Based on these statements by the President-elect, water investments are already increasing ahead of any actions the Trump administration may take.

On the local level the WV Department of Environmental Protection is having communities such as Milton focus more on reducing the amount of sediment going into storm drains. I understand that sometimes dirt and mud will enter the stormwater system but we as a City will need to do our best to keep mud from entering the drains. City crews will be trained to reduce the amount of dirt and mud entering the storm drains from their work sites. I encourage residents to do the same.



Floodplain—On April 1, 2017, National Flood Insurance Program rates are set to rise an average of 6 percent. This is less than the 2016 average and consistent with the annual 5-10% increases prior to 2012 Biggert-Waters reforms.



Under 2014 Affordability amendments, individual property owners may see a rate increase up to 18% for newer properties and 25% for older ones. Rates for newly mapped properties begin at the lowest or preferred risk rate and gradually increase to full risk using a multiplier table which is also updated as part of the April 1 changes.

The Milton Police Department also received the *AAA Gold Award* for traffic safety and enforcement for the year 2016.

A couple of notices we would like to pass on to the community. First, our office hours are M-F, 8:00 a.m.—4:00 p.m. and closed 12—1 for lunch. If you have an emergency, please call 911. Our officers are dispatched through Cabell County 911, not through our office.



Secondly, we would like to advise the community on the "school bus law". If you see a stopped school bus with its flashing warning signal lights on, **all lanes of traffic must stop** until the bus resumes motion. Even if you are going in the opposite direction of the school bus, you must stop until the bus resumes motion. The penalty for this offense carries a mandatory 30 day suspension of your license from the DMV. (WV Code 17C-12-7)

Finally I want to say how much I am enjoying the experience of serving the Milton Community and thank you all for the support you have shown our officers. I am immensely proud of this police department and the officers who serve in it. We look forward to serving and protecting you in 2017.

From the Code Enforcer/Inspector Bill Morris

Why backflow prevention is necessary—You know the old saying “an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.” Backflow prevention is a matter of protecting the quality and safety of our water supply.

Backflow prevention helps to ensure that dangerous contaminants, such as microorganisms, bacteria, noxious chemicals, heavy metals, gases and other potential threatening pollutants/substances do not enter the community's potable water system. Additionally, backflow prevention helps to ensure that an epidemic spread of life-threatening diseases, which can and have resulted in death, does not occur.



There are numerous and well-documented cases of not only pollutants spreading through the water supply, but also serious illnesses, leading to death, due to backflow into the potable water system. Some incidents date as far back as the turn of the century. Many incidents have occurred in the State of West Virginia. Additionally, other cases have occurred in various areas around the country.

Most homeowners do not know they alone are responsible for the safety of domestic water system. It is up to the water purveyor to inform them. Plumbing codes are very specific here in Milton and we require backflow protection by cross-connection control and many other important safety devices as required by the WVHDDR Bureau of Public Health, EW-114.
